Made in America Panel Urges America to Continue to Reject Obamacare despite Supreme Court Ruling

Neal Asbury began his nationally syndicated "Neal Asbury's Made in America" show on Radio America by expressing his shock and disappointment that the Supreme Court has upheld all of Obamacare. He reiterated that the cost of Obamacare will hit his business hard and will prevent him from hiring more employees.

Joining the show was first-time guest Republican Congressman Daniel Webster, a family man and small-business owner, who has dedicated himself to serving the citizens of Central Florida's eighth district with honor and integrity. For nearly three decades, he has fought on behalf of Florida's hard-working taxpayers and families to advance common-sense reforms and principled policy.

"A lot of people were taken by surprise by the Supreme Court ruling on Obamacare. They believed, and still believe, that it is unconstitutional. It is a bad law, and calling it a tax doesn't do anything to improve its acceptance," said Webster.

Webster described the ruling as "a

devastating blow to our economic growth and a disaster for small business. It is a job "restrictor" that makes it harder for small businesses to hire."

He noted that the Democrats have always tried to walk away from calling Obamacare a tax, but now that the Supreme Court has ruled it as such, they don't say a word. He predicted that many states will not accept Obamacare payments, putting more pressure on the middle class and the poor.

"This election in November has major consequences for our country. We can either solve our problems or continue on the current path of adding half-trillion dollars in new tax increases. We need to reinvigorate our base and reenergize the Tea Party to elect a new president," added Webster.

Neal and co-host Dr. Rich Roffman continued the discussion about Obamacare, with Neal expressing his outrage, and predicted an outpouring of American anger about the Supreme Court ruling. He admits he has never seen anything like it.

Dr. Roffman agreed and said "It is a very emotional topic. The 2010 Town Hall meetings are going to be resurrected because a lot of people are angry about Obamacare. This could be the push for Romney's popularity to soar," said Dr. Roffman.

"Calling this a tax scares small business, like mine. This will be the largest tax increase in history, and will have dire consequences to job creators. I'm at the point where healthcare costs for my 200 employees adds another 50 percent to my employee costs. I can't hire more employees with this kind of uncertainty," said Asbury.

Dr. Roffman summed it up: "You heard that there is no such thing as a free lunch? Well somebody's got to pay for Obamacare. You know who pays? Small business owners, the middle class, and the poor."

Joining the show was first time guest, Charles Butler, a Chicago radio host and an active member of Project 21, an initiative of The National Center for Public Policy Research to promote the views of

African-Americans whose entrepreneurial spirit, dedication to family and commitment to individual responsibility has not traditionally been echoed by the nation's civil rights establishment.

"Things like 'Fast and Furious,' illegal immigration, and gay marriage are turning into black issues. I'm very frustrated that black politicians aren't playing a role in these issues, or even in issues like crime and the disparity of jobs, and access to capital. Black unemployment stands at 17 percent nationally, but in Chicago, black unemployment for males is at 50 percent and 40 percent for black women," said Butler.

Butler noted that while Democrats traditionally get 80-90 percent of the black vote, he doesn't think that Obama will get more than 65 percent of the black vote in November. He reminded listeners that blacks made the most economic progress under Republican presidents. He noted that more blacks became millionaires under Reagan than under any other president.

"Black politicians should resign if they aren't ready to serve their

constituents instead of their political party. Blacks have been displaced for jobs by illegal immigrants and we need to address this. That's why immigration has become a black issue. That's why I want to see the Tea Party play a big role this November. This is an issue they care about. And despite what people say, the Tea Party is not racist. They want to see Americans succeed," concluded Butler.

Once again, Asbury and co-host Dr. Rich Roffman introduced their weekly "Cronyism Report," an ongoing look at how federal funding payouts are wasting taxpayer dollars.

"The next big Green energy firm going bankrupt after getting a DOE loan guarantee is solar panel manufacturer Abound Solar, which received a loan guarantee of \$400 million. After spending \$70 million, they went out of business and fired all their 125 employees," said Dr. Roffman.

"If you think Green energy is prone to cronyism, just wait until Obamacare takes hold in 2014. It's going to be cronyism on steroids as bureaucrats get their hands on tril-

lions of dollars. It's going to look like Indonesia under Suharto," predicted Asbury.
